# **Homework Policy**

### A Policy for Homework

#### 1. Introduction

The Governors and staff at Cotherstone Primary School believe that homework is an important aspect of our curriculum because it:

- Ensure that parents are clear about what their child is expected to do.
- Ensure consistency of approach throughout the school.
- To use homework as a tool to help to continue to raise standards of attainment and enjoyment of learning.
- Improve the quality of the learning experience offered to pupils and to extend it beyond the classroom environment.
- Provide opportunities for parents, children and the school to work together in partnership in relation to children's learning.
- Encourage pupils and their parents to share and enjoy learning experiences.
- Reinforce work covered in class by providing further opportunities for the individual pupil.
- To practise or consolidate basic skills and knowledge, especially in numeracy and literacy.
- Encourage children to develop the responsibility, confidence and self-discipline needed to study independently.
- Provides a gradual introduction to good working habits which will stand our pupils in good stead for the future.
- To prepare Year 6 pupils for the transfer to secondary school.

#### Role of the Class Teacher

- To provide an explanation of homework tasks to parents when necessary and give guidance of how they might assist their child.
- To set up regular homework in an easily followed routine.
- To ensure that homework is set consistently across classes.
- To set homework that takes equal opportunities into account.
- To ensure any homework is purposeful and links directly to the taught curriculum.
- To reward and praise children who regularly complete homework tasks using our rewards system
- To mark homework and give feedback to pupils, excluding phonics.

#### Role of Parents/Carers

- To support the school by ensuring that their child attempts the homework
- To provide a suitable place for their child to carry out their homework.
- To encourage and praise their child when they have completed their homework, creating a positive environment.
- To become actively involved and support their child with homework activities, including helping children develop time management skills when longer projects are set, and independent skills.
- To make it clear that they value homework and they support the school by explaining how it can help learning.

#### Homework should:

- Be marked in accordance with Cotherstone Primary School 'A Policy for Marking';
- Be differentiated according to ability of the pupils;
- Not require resources which one would be unlikely to find at home;
- Be easily understood by the child and satisfying to do, but also provide challenge;
- Be voluntary, with parents making the ultimate decision as to whether or not it is appropriate for their child to complete homework set.

Year Groups	Time	Type of Homework
Years 1 and 2	1 hour per week	Reading, spellings, other literacy and number work.
Years 3 and 4	1.5 Hours per week	Literacy and numeracy as Years 1 and 2 with occasional assignments in other subjects.
Years 5 and 6	30 minutes daily	Regular weekly schedule with continued emphasis on Literacy and numeracy but also ranging widely over the curriculum

#### Statement of Position at Cotherstone Primary School

At Cotherstone Primary School Homework is set as follows using the recommended time allowances:

Class	Type of Homework
Class 1	Reading, word work, learning sounds, high frequency words,
	numeracy games. Curriculum related tasks for Years 1 and 2
Class 2	Reading, spellings, numeracy (including multiplication and
	division facts) and curriculum related tasks. These tasks
	may be investigative or formal in nature.
Class 3	Reading, spellings, numeracy (including multiplication and
	division facts). Curriculum tasks will become more formal in
	format and may be investigative in nature but require a
	written report. Year 6 pupils will have SATs preparation
	work.

Homework is not set for holidays.

It is appreciated that many of our pupils attend extra-curricular activities either at school or outside of school. In addition a number of children are learning to play a musical instrument and need to allow time to practice. Time spent as a family is precious, as is a good night's sleep. A balance needs to be achieved at all times. As such, although encouraged, homework has to be considered voluntary depending upon family circumstances.

#### Role of the Head teacher and Governing Body

• To check compliance of the Policy.

• To meet and talk with parents when appropriate.

• To discuss with staff how far the policy is being successfully implemented.
